Of course this did not happen without tremendous bloodshed and civil war, with Chinese people on either sides of this conflict. What were the numbers of those slaughtered? Again, we can only estimate because this is not a topic China is transparent on. The lowest death toll estimates for the second Chinese civil war are around 100,000 but most historians believe it to be over one million people. Some put that number at three million and Rummel, who also works in the estimates of the democide and the subsequent famine, gives a number of over six million. Mao launched a massive initiative to industrialize the country and this initiative and the subsequent famine that followed it, resulting from it, took the lives of somewhere between 20 million and 46 million people between the years of 1958 and 1962.

Chinese communists set up a country where citizens had no rights, no freedoms, were monitored, taken advantage of and ruled over with an iron fist.

China practices the suppression of religious freedom, the suppression of freedom of speech, the suppression of freedom of press, suppression of freedom of association, suppression of freedom of assembly, and is believed to have practiced organ harvesting. Christian churches are frequently disrupted and their leaders arrested. Churches are sometimes bulldozed down so that their congregants can't use them. China controls what its citizens can and cannot view on the internet. It practices numerous forms of torture.

China requires, for their records, the DNA samples, fingerprints, eye scans and blood types of millions of people. China has a mass surveillance system for monitoring the Chinese population. It includes video cameras, mobile phone tracking surveillance drones, etc. By 2019, it is believed that 200 million monitoring surveillance cameras were in operation in China as part of their skynet system. However by the end of 2020 it is forecast that they will have 626 million surveillance cameras in operation. Chinese citizens have a "Social Credit" number assigned to them and this number increases and decreases, depending on their behavior. Your social credit number score determines how many freedoms you are permitted to enjoy. Chinese internment camps are another hot topic on which we have no transparency from Chinese authorities. As of 2018, it was estimated that the Chinese government has detained hundreds of thousands or perhaps a million of its people in these camps. For decades it only allowed one child per family, with certain exceptions, and required abortion when mothers became pregnant outside of these parameters. China practices capital punishment, not just for murder but, for other offenses. It is estimated that over 1000 people are executed every year in China. The iron fist is in full swing and western nations find China's controls over it's people excessive and cruel.

The Chinese Communist Party found a friend in the Canadian Liberal party. When the Communist Party of China came to power in 1949, Canada's relations with China ended. However in 1970 Liberal Prime Minister Pierre Tudeau reversed this position and established relations with the Communist Party of China. Canada was one of the

Chretien years saw a great deepening of that relationship. His government gave the them access to the powers of the Mutual Legal Assistance in Criminal Matters Act. The Chretien administration supported China's accession to the World Trade Organization. Once China received accession in the United Nations World Trade Organization, they were set on a course to economic success. CAN THE FREE WORLD AND COMMUNISM COEXIST? IMPLICATIONS FOR CHINESE AND CANADIAN TRADE

I have a question for you to consider. Can the free world and communism co-exist? Communism is an ideology that formed out of the socialist movement of 19th century industrial Europe. In 1848, Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels coined the phrase "Communist" by publishing the Communist Manifesto. Communist as a political system was put into practice in Russia as a result of the Bolshevik Revolution. The <u>Soviet Union</u> was established in 1922.

In attempting to answer the question, "Can the free world and communism co-exist?" we must first recognize that communism was created to be an antithesis to free world capitalism. Socialist leaders Marx, Engles and Lenin were deeply offended at the system that the free world practiced and consciously designed another system that was meant to be an exact opposite.

Communism was a revolution and foundational to the ideology was the position that the communist revolution had to be the last revolution. These early leaders interpreted all of history in terms of class struggle. The system that they rejected was, to them, one where the working class always lost out to the ruling or managing class. They proposed to turn that equation around through revolution. However, for it to be the last revolution, democracy could not be allowed. This is because if the communist government could be voted out of power then the equation would then revert back to subjugation of the workers. This was their reasoning.

These early leaders who formed the system of communism were succeeded by a leader who would live out the system of communism and that leader was Joseph Stalin. Lenin died in 1924 and, after a power struggle, Stalin assumed control of the Soviet Union. He conducted huge purges, having all of his known enemies killed. However, he didn't stop at killing leaders. He turned on his own people. Exact numbers are impossible to determine. Some of the victims died in labor camps, others in and through forced collectivization (a program where people forfeited land, which became collective farms and sold most of the harvest to the state at low prices set by the government), others as a result of famine and others by executions. Low estimates say that 10 million died as a result of these things, but other reports place that number at 20 million and even 40 million.

Stalin had an answer for our question. In 1952, he delivered a speech in which he declared that communism could co-exist with capitalism (in so far as communist countries were concerned) but capitalist countries would always be at war with each other.

However, while Stalin professed that both systems could co-exist in the world, he would not allow any aspect of capitalism to be included in the Soviet system. He believed that the USSR had to be all or nothing communism with no capitalistic elements in their form of government.

What happened from there? Well, from 1940 to 1979 communism spread, either by force or by acceptance, to Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Yugoslavia, Poland, North Korea, Albania, Bulgaria, Romania, Czechoslovakia, East Germany, Hungary, China, Tibet, North Vietnam, Guinea, Cuba, Yemen, Kenya, Sudan, Congo, Burma, Angola, Benin, Cape Verde, Laos, Kampuchea, Madagascar, Mozambique, South Vietnam, Somalia, Seychelles, Afghanistan, Grenada and Nicaragua. The Soviet Union was the motherland and these other states were, to one degree or another, satellites of the Soviet Union. Their systems and economies were linked and integrated. Did communism raise the standard of living of the people in these states to the standard of living experienced by those in the free world? No, it did not. Communism marked the beginning of what is called the "second world." The third world are impoverished nations, mostly in Africa. The second world is the communist world and the Western free world is called the first world.

As history progressed the gap between the first world and the second world became very stark. The first world had freedom, a high standard of living, opportunity and wealth. The second world had a low standard of living and poverty. It didn't take long for many

people in the second world to start leaving for the first world. What would be the response from communist governments to the exodus?

The responses of communist governments were essentially, stop it. Stop it by force. Citizens had to be made to stay a part of the communist system. It was the law. When the law was not enough to hold people, communist governments started building barriers and iron curtains. When people still escaped, governments doubled down and fortified their iron curtains as much as they possibly could.

The iron curtain around east Germany was probably the greatest example of what I am trying to say. It is also referred to as the Berlin Wall. This was a 7,000-kilometre-long (4,300 mi) physical barrier of fences, walls, watchtowers and minefields that divided "east" and "west" Germany. Before the wall went up, between the years of 1945 and 1961, 3.454 million East Germans migrated to West Germany. After the construction of the wall many East Germans still chose to defect and braved the wall. Between 1961 and 1971 approximately 2,300 successfully escaped each year. The government kept doubling down on their efforts to fortify the wall. During the 1970s only around 868 per year were escaping and between 1980 and 1988 only around 334 per year were escaping. Just how many East Germans were gunned down or blown up trying to escape the wall? Such information has never been officially published; it is a secret. Wikipedia says that unofficial estimates of how many people died trying to escape East Germany are around 1,100 people.

How well did the communist and free world co-exist during this period of time? We look back on most of the twentieth century as the cold war era where the world's two superpowers The United States and The Soviet Union were locked into a political arm-wresle over which system would be dominant in the world. As the conflict intensified, populations feared that tensions would culminate in nuclear war.

Nuclear war between the communist world and the free world didn't happen, at least not yet. What did happen? Well, the Soviet Union unravelled, went bankrupt, collapsed, imploded, self-destructed. The Soviet Union could not hold communism together so it let it fall apart. It was an incredible moment in world history when, in 1989, the Berlin wall fell and East Germans freely crossed over to the other side. 1991 was another pivotal year. Between August and December, all the individual republics of the Soviet Union, including Russia, had either seceded from the Union or, at the very least, denounced the treaty that had created the Soviet Union. In December of 1991, the Supreme Soviet voted the USSR itself out of existence. Member states of the union became sovereign countries. The great arm wrestle between America and the Soviet Union was over and America had won.

Why did communism fail as a political system? It had too many inherent flaws. It was doomed to fail from the beginning. It is just unfortunate that tens of millions of people died during the whole

experiment. It was built on socialism, a belief that puts the government in control and responsible for providing for the citizens. Citizens are expected to work hard in the system for the betterment of all, not for personal gain. Effort is not rewarded and, eventually, enthusiasm wears off. When the population becomes lethargic more and more controls have to be implemented by government to whip the people into productivity. As standards of living keep decreasing the population becomes more and more defiant. The people then want to flee the system and a police state has to be set up to hold things together and to suppress dissent. Iron curtains, mine fields, watchtowers, barbed wire, torture, firing squads all need to be employed to hold communism together. But why not just let it fall apart?

Meanwhile, in the free world people have freedom and with freedom comes opportunity. People pursue opportunity and take risks. With opportunity and risk taking there is an incentive for hard work. With hard work and effort the free world begins moving forward and upward and people begin attaining their goals.

Can these two systems co-exist? Can they be intermingled? What happened after the collapse of the USSR?In the aftermath, most communist countries abandoned communism. However, a few have held out. They are China, Cuba, Laos and Vietnam and North _ Korea. While ascribing to Marxism and following communism, most

of these communist countries prefer to be called "socialist countries" instead of "communist," because of the stigma.

Four of the five countries that have continued with communism are impoverished. At least this is true of their people; their leaders of course live very well. The one country that is in some ways an exception is China.

What is the history of Chinese communism?

Communist leader Mao Zedong began a revolution in China in 1946. By 1949 he had taken control of the country and fully established national communist rulership and ironically called China the "People's Republic of China." Of course this did not happen without tremendous bloodshed and civil war, with Chinese people on either sides of this conflict. What were the numbers of those slaughtered? Again, we can only estimate because this is not a topic China is transparent on. The lowest death toll estimates for the second Chinese civil war are around 100,000 but most historians believe it to be over one million people. Some put that number at three million and Rummel, who also works in the estimates of the democide and the subsequent famine, gives a number of over six million. Mao launched a massive initiative to industrialize the country and this initiative and the subsequent famine that followed it, resulting from it, took the lives of somewhere between 20 million and 46 million people between the years of 1958 and 1962.

In trying to understand communist China we must realize that it is a strange creature. Chinese communism is not identical to Soviet communism. China took from the Soviet example the police state. They copied from the system the aspects where citizens had no rights, no freedoms, were monitored, taken advantage of and ruled over with an iron fist. However, quite a bit of capitalistic trade and commerce is conducted as China has incorporated capitalism into its communism.

Back to the iron-fist elements of Chinese communism. Human rights is something that China and the western world have disagreed on for decades. China practices the suppression of religious freedom, the suppression of freedom of speech, the suppression of freedom of press, suppression of freedom of association, suppression of freedom of assembly, and practices organ harvesting. Christian churches are frequently disrupted and their leaders arrested. Churches are sometimes bulldozed down so that their congregants can't use them. China controls what its citizens can and cannot view on the internet. It practices numerous forms of torture. China requires, for their records, the DNA samples, fingerprints, eye scans and blood types of millions of people. China has a mass surveillance system for monitoring the Chinese population. What is the response of the Chinese government to western criticism of their controls. The Chinese government says that they practice "'Asian values" and that these values protect the welfare of the collective and that the rights of the collective should always be put ahead of the rights of any individual.

So, how is the collective doing in their Peoples Republic of China? Again, relying on information coming out of China is frustrating. They would lead us to believe that standards of living are steadily rising. The Chinese government would say that there are a little over thirty million people living in poverty in China. So I ask, where would you rather live in Canada or in China?

Well, can't the Chinese communist system be reformed so that it is free and democratic? That would mean embracing the exact opposite of what it was designed to be. Remember communism was designed to be an exact opposite of free world system. Also, central to its ideology is the position that communism is the last revolution. After it is established, no more revolutions are allowed. In free nations, when the people disprove of their leaders, they vote in new ones or sometimes they hold demonstrations to express their feelings and call for change. Chinese students tried a demonstration like this in 1989 in Tiananmen Square. The demonstration lasted 1 month, 2 weeks and 6 days and then, in front of the whole world, the Chinese government levelled their guns on the crowd and gunned down the best and brightest of their own people. Demonstrations don't work in communist China because the government doesn't care. More recently, Chinese freedom seekers began protests in Hong Kong, in march of 2019, that have been ongoing and, to my knowledge, have been suspended only because of the corona virus outbreak. It began as a protest over an extradition bill that China forced on Hong Kong so that it could apprehend persons and put them on trial in mainland China. The protesters later expanded the protest to call for other freedoms.

At various times in the protests numbers have swelled to the hundreds of thousands. What did the Chinese government do? They suspended the bill but but have resisted granting other freedoms and requests. There are two reported deaths and 7,950 arrests of protesters. The demonstrations, which are unprecedented in Chinese history for their numbers and for their size, could just as easily be

twice that size and twice that duration because, in the end, the government doesn't care. The Chinese government has sophisticated weapons of mass destruction that it could turn on its own people if it needed to retain its hold on rulership.

What about this strange mixing of Soviet communism and socialism with economic capitalism and can it co-exist with the western free-world system? China's government has blended the systems to create, in their eyes, the best of both worlds. They rule China's population with an iron fist. They control the flow of information so that the population can't see the whole picture. They have marshaled the workforce into working long hours for low wages, and they reap great profits. They do share those profits with the rest of the world and that is what makes their products so attractive. No one can compete with their prices.

What happens when the free world engages with Communist China for business and trys to compete with their system? First, lets look at the relationship between the United States and China. Under U.S. president Bill Clinton, in the 2000 <u>United States—China Relations Act</u>, the U.S. gave China a "Most Favored Nation Status." This blew the doors wide open for China to have normal economic relations with America. However, it soon became apparent that the US could not compete with China's low priced products and a trade deficit began to form and grow. In 1990, the deficit was \$10.4 billion. It increased to \$83.8 billion in 2000, and in 2010, swelled to \$273 billion. This number continued to grow and in 2017, the value

of Chinese goods coming into the United States (\$505 billion) exceeded United States exports to China (\$130 billion) by roughly \$375 billion. With the United States hemorrhaging this kind of money, and trade deficits mushrooming to 375 billion, it was becoming unclear who would win the arm-wrestle. America was not wrestling with the Soviet Union anymore. It was wrestling with China instead. The arm-wrestle was over economics. With this arm-wrestle raging, a new candidate put his name forward to run in the 2016 election. Donald Trump vowed to aggressively attack the trade deficit by placing tariffs on China's products. After being elected to the presidency, he did exactly that and began a trade war with China that is unprecedented in U.S./China relations.

The question still remains. Can the free world and Chinese communism co-exist? Can they compete fairly or will one overthrow the other? Can they be in an economic partnership together without one side dominating the other? China, by marshaling its population, can seemingly produce products cheaper than anyone else. They are also accused of manipulating their currency to further leverage their profits. They also lend huge amounts of money to borrower nations. They own one trillion dollars worth of America's debt. How long will it be until this economic relationship becomes really toxic and irreversible? Why not just stop trading with China? That's it, just stop!

There is one thing stopping the free world from ceasing trade with China. What is that one thing? It will surprise you. It's called globalism.

What is globalism? Globalism is an ideology about becoming interconnected with the rest of the world. We have been told that globalism is all about diversity and multiculturalism. We have been told that globalism is all about having a friendlier face towards foreign people and enriching our culture by blending it with other cultures. We have been told that globalism is a friendly belief that opens us up to all of the good that can be found across the globe. Sorry to burst your bubble, but that is not what globalism is. Globalism is an economic strategy. It was devised by powerful multinational companies. These multinational companies constitute the wealthiest elites in the world. They have enacted a strategy by which they have partnered themselves with the Chinese government. What is this Partnership? Its called "outsourcing." They have moved much of their manufacturing base to China where they can benefit from cheap labour. Labour that has no rights. Labour that is strictly disciplined by its government. In this partnership they share the profits with Chinas's government. The partnership works well for both the multinational companies and China's communist party. This is what globalism is. Globalism is not friendly Canadian diversity and niceness. Globalism is money, or perhaps I should say, the love of money.

Well, what if we just stop globalism and business with communist China, both? Well, there is a problem. Our government believes in globalism. What does our government believe? Our Canadian government is made up of mostly Liberals and Conservatives. I know, there is also NDP, Green, Block, etc. The two prevailing views are Liberal and Conservative. Liberals are all in, with both feet, 100 percent hog-wild in favour of globalism. Globalism is the religion of Liberalism. Conservatives, on the other hand, are not nearley as globalistic. at 1.86 trillion dollars. We exceed them in one category, we have more debt than they do. We have three times more debt than they do. We have different systems and they play by a different set of rules. They are ready to wrestle.

Will somebody please tell our politicians that this is not a good match up. That is, not good for us. There is a long list of other countries that did business with China, that today are in debt bondage to imperialist communist China. Our Liberal politicians need to change their core beliefs. Can free Canada and communist China co-exist in an economic struggle? Some of our politicians are shaking hands with a government that has an awful lot of blood on its hands. Tell the multinational elite that it is not worth it to us. We stand with fellow Canadians and with the common Chinese man and woman in their struggle to be free.

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1. CHINA'S BUSINESS DEALINGS AND THE WORLD COMING UNDER DEBT BONDAGE

It's called the Belt Road Initiative and much of the world is onboard with this Chinese plan. The Belt Road Initiative is a program where China is lending colossal amounts of money to nations around the world for the purpose of rebuilding infrastructure. That infrastructure is in the form of new ports, railways, highways, power stations, aviation and telecommunications. The infrastructure connects countries to China to better facilitate trade.

It was originally called One Belt One Road back in 2013 when it was launched. Now the money lending and the infrastructure

building is being implemented on a global scale. The program has an estimated completion date of 2049. World involvement in the program accounts for about 65 per cent of the world's population, one-third of the world's GDP, and about a one-fourth of all the goods and services the world transports.

Who is signing up for the Belt Road Initiative? According to Wikipedia, there are sixty-eight countries taking the loans and investments. Countries all over Asia, Africa, Europe and the Middle East are signing on the dotted line and borrowing the money. By 2018, Singapore had borrowed 24.3 billion, Malaysia 14.1 billion, Russia Federation 10.4 billion, Indonesia 9.4 billion, South Korea 8.1 billion, Israel 7.9 billion and Pakistan, which is practically a third world nation and does not have the ability to pay off the debt, borrowed 7.6 billion.

Pakistan is not the only country that is going into huge debt to China without the ability to pay it back. The African continent is literally being taken over by China. China wants their oil, their rare metals, their fish supplies and their land which it is using to grow crops. Africa is having a difficult time feeding its own populations and now farmland is being used to supply China's needs. African debt load to China is staggering, owing China more than \$140 billion. There are numerous African countries that owe at least 20% of their nominal GDP to China. All of these nations are very poor and do not have the ability to pay back the debt.

What about Canada? Are we apart of the Belt Road Initiative? Not officially, but through the back door we are. We are involved through the backdoor by involvement with SNC Lavalin. This Quebec company is heavily involved in Belt Road infrastructure projects around the world. SNC Lavalin became headline news across Canada when the <u>Parliament of Canada</u>'s <u>Ethics</u>

Commissioner, Mario Dion found that Trudeau tried to improperly influence Attorney General Jody Wilson-Raybould, the former Minister of Justice, to intervene in an ongoing criminal case against this company. When Conservatives tried to open a probe into the case, Liberals blocked the move. Raybould is also not allowed to discuss the matter because of solicitor-client privilege. Trudeau expelled Wilson-Raybould from the Liberal Caucus on April 2, 2019, and stripped her of the Liberal party nomination for the next election.

Regardless of our involvement in SNC Lavalin, Canada owes China a lot of money. Canada is one of a number of countries whose debt to China is somewhere between 5-10 percent of our GDP. China is Canada's second largest trading partner and our economies are very much interconnected.

There is a counter strategy to offset Chinese dominance and the Belt Road. The countries of the United States, Australia, Japan, and India joined forces to create the "Blue Dot Network". This is a strategic economic and military plan to secure the Pacific Ocean and guaranteeing free trade in the region. The United States refers to this

plan as the "Free and Open Indo-Pacific strategy" (FOIP). President <u>Donald Trump</u> has organized this strategy around security, economics, and governance. He has also shown a great willingness to conduct trade war with China. This is a direct counterattack against Chinese dominance.

How much money will China lend to the world through their Belt Road Initiative? There is not a set amount but it is believed to be in the trillions. China assures the world that this is all just a natural part of globalism. Their end date of 2049 will coincide with the 100th anniversary of the People's Republic of China. If everything transpires the way they want it to, by 2049 the world's infrastructure will all be set up with its roads, ship lines, trains, etc, all flowing back to China. The world will be buried in debt to China and they will be collecting their interest. They will be celebrating their nation and rich multinational corporations that outsourced their manufacturing to China will be celebrating too. It will be a great day for China, for globalism and for communism. It will be a bad day for you as you see your taxes rising higher to cover interest payments on our debt. It will be a bad day if things continue down the present path.

Do things have to continue down the present path? Why not make a break? It is time for Canada to open our eyes to where we are headed and change course. We don't need Communist China. The Blue Dot Network could turn the tables. Let us restructure. Let's free

ourselves while freedom is within reach and while we have partners who are willing to do the same.

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CORONAVIRUS, BIOLOGICAL EXPERIMENTS AND WHAT IS CHINA'S RESPONSIBILITY?

As I sit here writing this article, there are 3,926,456 cases of corona virus in the world, 66,434 in my own country. Worldwide275,395 people have died. All over the world families have been torn apart, economies have been shattered, unemployment is soaring, debt is being assumed at never-before rates. All of this is because of a virus, or should I say, our response to it.

As people try to come to terms with what has happened and what is happening, people are disturbed to hear different accounts and contradictory information in the explanations.

China reported to the World Health Organisation on December 31 of 2019, that a cluster of viral pneumonia cases broke out in Wuhan China. They later filled in the following details. They told the world that the first case of a person having the virus was discovered on December 12 (later changed to December 8) and that the outbreak was most likely linked to the Huanan Seafood Wholesale Market and that the virus is closely related to bat corona viruses. They maintained that the virus had a natural origin in bats and must have jumped species into humans visiting Huanan Seafood

<u>Wholesale Market</u>. The United Nations World Health Organization quickly accepted China's version of the story and has praised them for their transparency.

However, China's version of the story is not the only version. One question that is now asked is why did China wait for as long as it did before notifying the World Health Organization? Doctors in China began notifying both the Chinese government and later, the world through social media that a virus was spreading. Information is coming out claiming that these posts were quickly censured and that the doctors were summoned by the police. They were warned not to spread these reports. There is now information suggesting that the numbers of people infected was much higher than what was initially reported. There is also information suggesting that a great many cases had no connection to the seafood market.

Could there have been another source for the virus other than the seafood market? It just so happens that in <u>Wuhan</u>, China there is a <u>Wuhan</u> Institute of Virology. It just so happens that a Dr. Shi Zhengli who has been working there for years has been conducting experiments on transferring corona virus from bats to other mammals. She has published more than one paper on corona virus studies. Is it coincidence that her work was being conducted in Wuhan, China?

This is the story that people would now like to know more about. I recently listened to an episode of BBC news program "Hardtalk" in which the interviewer was questioning a Chinese official. The official went on and on about how China is not to blame. The interviewer asked about some of the information coming out suggesting that the government shut down early reports of the spread. The official said that the government did not want panic to break out in the population.

So, in other words, panic didn't break out but the virus did. If I may express my opinion, we don't need governments, whether they be in Beijing or whether they be in Ottawa, controlling the flow of information, controlling what people know, think and believe. Just tell the people and the world the truth and maybe a pandemic could be averted.

There is more information that is troubling. Now that this virus has been studied, it is noted that the "E" protein component to the virus has 100% amino acid similarity to a corona virus found in bats. This amount of similarity makes it extremely unlikely for the mutation to be a natural one. This degree of similarity suggest that the virus was engineered. The corona virus that is spreading in humans has an "S" protein that makes it transmittable to human beings. This also suggests engineering. Without this protein it could not infect people.

Why would a deadly virus be engineered? What possible good effect could come of such an experiment? Why would studies be done on how to make a bat virus transmittable to other mammals? Why do we need this kind of science? What possible purpose could such technology be used for?

Danny Shoham, an Israeli expert in biological warfare and former intelligence officer, published an article in India's Journal Of Defence studies called "China's Biological Warfare Program: An Interpretive Study with Special Reference to Biological Weapons Capabilities." In that report, he claims that China has 42 facilities involved in research, development, production and testing of biological weapons.

What kind of government would study, test and manufacture biological weapons? In 1999 two Chinese colonels published a book titled "Unrestricted Warfare." This book outlines the strategy for a smaller army to defeat a larger, stronger nation than itself. It theorizes that a weaker nation may defeat a stronger nation if it employs a total unrestricted type of war involving as many forms of subversion as possible, both military and non-military. Could biological weapons be a form of unrestricted warfare?

The World Health Organization was very quick to take the side of China. They have praised China for making a quick response to the

outbreak and for their transparency. On January 14, the World Health Organization informed the world that there was "no clear evidence" that the corona virus could spread from people to people. I listened to them on the news say again and again that the corona outbreak was not a pandemic. It was not until March 11, 2020, that they had to admit that it was a pandemic. Why is there such a contrast in these two narratives? The consequences of China falling out of favour with the rest of the world is huge for globalists and perhaps also for globalist organizations such as the United Nations World Health Organization. China is a centrepiece of the current global economic system. However, China is now facing calls for accountability.

A class action lawsuit in Florida directed against China is just one of several lawsuits that are being filed in federal courts across America. The Florida suit is for six trillion U.S. dollars. Even the Missouri state government is filing a lawsuit of this kind. They feel that there is enough compelling evidence to find the Chinese government guilty. Meanwhile, numerous nations, including Australia, have called for an international inquiry into China's handling of the crisis. United States president Donald Trump has also made statements about not being happy with China right now and that the virus could have been stopped there.

Could it be that the government of China is responsible for the pandemic either intentionally or unintentionally and that they could be made to pay trillions in compensation? It may come down to whether or not globalist forces are successful in advancing China's narrative over the call for accountability. The World Health

Organization has many fans and our Liberal Canadian government has emphasized that the World Health Organization has cooperated with its partners to make available the most accurate scientific evidence possible in response to the coronavirus pandemic. The Canadian government website states "We fully support the World Health Organization in leading the global public health response, as well as the efforts of the wider United Nations, the World Bank Group, and other international and regional organizations as they come together in a coordinated, coherent whole to respond to the wider socio-economic impacts of the crisis."

However, serious investigations and lawsuits are underway. What will they uncover? Will China's story and the story of the World Health Organization, as well as Canada's story hold up to intense cross examination? Who will be the world leaders at the time that the truth is known? If the nations are led by establishment, fence sitting, business as usual politicians then the globalist narrative will prevail. However, if you have someone in the Whitehouse who is unconventional, bold, brash and not afraid to confront, there could be a reckoning for China. There could even be a great overturning of the present world system with China loosing its privileged place. Other countries will wait and see what America does in this great showdown and then take their cue when the dust settles and they see that it is safe.

At this point nothing has been proven with absolute certainty. The investigations are underway. Even at this stage, there are some things that we should rally behind. There are things in this world that

we don't need. We don't need governments controlling what we know, think or believe. We don't need giant organizations downplaying world crisis. We don't need biological experiments on how to transmit deadly viruses across species. We don't need biological weapons programs. We don't need governments run by military high brass who care more about the glory of empire rather than the plight of human beings. We don't need unrestricted warfare. We don't need a liberal globalism that covers up. If any of these things are support pillars for the communist government of China then maybe we don't need economic relations with that government either.

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Hong Kong Protests

As of Tuesday June 30, 2020, there is a new law in Hong Kong. The law was made in Beijing and is imposed on the people of Hong Kong. The law was made to crush the protest movement for freedom. Some of the fine points of the law are as follows:

- Offences of subversion, secession and collusion with foreign entities are punishable by a minimum of three years, and a maximum of life.
- Propagating hatred of China Communist Party and Hong Kong's regional government is not allowed.
- Those found guilty will not be permitted to serve in public office.
- Beijing will have a new policing force in Hong Kong, that is not subject to the regional government of Hong Kong.
- Rulings of the national security commission, cannot be appealed.
- Foreign news agencies will not work autonomously.

The Chinese government now can officially arrest protesters and, in the worst case scenario, jail them for life. Citizens who feel violated by this law dare not continue protesting or to speak against the Communist Party unless they are prepared to pay a terrible price. The Communist Party of China hopes that these measures will sufficiently intimidate and coerce the people into submission and passivity.

What is the relationship between China and Hong Kong? Hong Kong benefited under stable British governance for over 100 years. However, when Britain's most recent 99 year lease of Hong Kong expired in 1997, Hong Kong was given over to China. The changeover was not without agreed upon stipulations. It was agreed that Hong Kong would continue to have freedoms such as freedom of speech and a separate judicial system than that of communist China for at least 50 years. Hong Kong was to be semi-autonomous under a "one country, two system" policy. The Sino-British declaration was an official agreement that Hong Kong would enjoy "a high degree of autonomy."

Protests broke out in 2019 over an extradition bill put forward by the Hong Kong government that would have allowed for certain wanted individuals to be extradited to elsewhere in China to be judged by the Chinese communist system. This was a clear violation of the semi-autonomous conditions and Hong Kong residents began protesting.

The protests begun in 2019 have continued into 2020. These protests have grown to unprecedented levels in Hong Kong and have been reported on throughout the world. How many Hong Kong citizens have participated and shown their support of the protests? There is a great difference in the numbers reported by the protest organizers

and the Chinese Communist government. One protest drew a crowd of 800,000, according to protest organizers. According to the police this number was 183,000. It has been estimated that in just one protest, 25% of Hong Kong's population participated. However high the number of participants, the protests have made quite a statement. They serve as an expression of the people's will. Unfortunately a new law designed to crush the will of the people has come about.

What was the response of the Communist Party initially and during the many days of the protests? Despite a demonstration of hundreds of thousands on June 9, 2019, the government pressed ahead with a second reading of the bill. There was a massive standoff between police and protesters and the government decided to suspend the bill on June 15, and eventually, months later, retracted it on Oct 23.

What happened in the time leading up to the bill's withdrawal and the time afterwards? There were demonstrations, protests and tremendous standoffs between protesters and police. There are many accusations of the police of using excessive force. A law was brought in banning protesters from wearing masks. The masks concealed the identity of protesters from facial recognition technology and it protected them to some degree from the effects of tear gas. The masks were banned but many protesters continued to wear them. In all of the clashes there were a reported 2,600 injuries, 2 deaths, 9000 arrests and 1,200 charges made against protesters.

One particularly violent episode in this conflict occurred on October 1, 2019 which happened to be the 70th anniversary of communist rule over China. Authorities were determined that the Communist Government would be honoured and not dishonoured on that day. They exerted great effort to oppose the protest. Police fired live rounds into the crowd and one 18 year old protester was killed. In all they fired 1,400 tear gas canisters into the crowds and made 269 arrests that day.

One particularly grievous death in the time of this conflict is the death of Chan Yin-lam. This 15 year old girl had become involved in the protests. Her naked corpse was found floating in the sea near Yau Tong on September 22, 2019. It is unclear if she was murdered or if she committed suicide out of grief.

Throughout this conflict protesters showed great courage and expanded their demands to more than just the repeal of the bill. They also demanded that the arrested protesters be released and for the setup of an independent commission to evaluate the level of use of force that was used by the police. They also called for the resignation of Carrie Lam, the chief executive who had supported the bill.

What is China's response? Ultimately it is the response of the June 30, 2020 law. Protesters now face the threat of life imprisonment and are not allowed to speak against the Communist Party government. There will be Chinese police in Hong Kong, there will be

prosecutions, rulings cannot be appealed and foreign media will be restricted.

It is time for Canada to respond with serious opposition towards a Chinese Communist Party that does not reflect our values. What will our leaders do? Will they look the other way or has this finally gone too far?

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Taiwan And China

Just 180 kilometers (112 mi) off the shores of China is an island nation that we call Taiwan. It is populated by over 23 million people. Its political system is a unitary semi-presidential republic. Its people are very hard working and its economy is made up of mostly small

and medium-sized businesses.

Taiwan has been very successful and continues on in international commerce and trade. However, the eyes of China have been fixed on Taiwan for decades. They want it, they want it all.

What is the relationship between Taiwan and China? To understand this we need to go back to before the Chinese civil war. The ancient Qing dynasty had ruled China for 268 years but early in the twentieth century it fell apart and was replaced by a republic form of government known as the ROC. However, these developments were watched by communists who longed to see China come over into the fold of the communist world. They organized themselves and between the years of 1927 and 1949, the Chinese communist government battled a brutal and bloody war against the ROC, displacing them from most of China. The ROC were beaten back to the island of Taiwan, some smaller islands, and Mongolia. Eventually, they lost control of Mongolia and even the island of Taiwan was taken over, not by China but, by the Japanese. After Japan's loss of WWII, America helped the ROC get re-established in Taiwan and the ROC has ruled it ever since.

Even though the Communist Party of China has never owned or ruled Taiwan, their greedy eyes have been fixed on it for decades. They do not recognize Taiwan as being a separate country and they do not want the rest of the world to do so either.

The Communist Party of China has laid it on the line. They say that they will not have any diplomatic relations with any country that officially recognizes the government of Taiwan. However, they will allow countries to do financial business with Taiwan.

How much political leverage has the Communist government of China been able to use against Taiwan. They have leveraged a great deal of power against Taiwan, thanks to the United Nations. In 1791, wanting to embrace Communist China, the United Nations banished the Taiwan government from having a seat in the United Nations and gave their seat to China. Taiwan has since requested to re-join the U.N. multiple times but has been refused each time.

How have other countries responded to Taiwan and to China's threat to break diplomatic relations with those who recognize Taiwan? Most countries are quite willing to do business with Taiwan but are not willing to officially recognize her as a nation. The shunning must continue in order to continue to do business with China. Canada is one such country that follows this two-faced approach. There is much economic trade between Canada and China, so many of our politicians want the status quo maintained. Recognizing Taiwan might disrupt the flow of money and that frightens many Canadian politicians, especially Liberal politicians who established the relationship with Communist China in the first place, under Pierre

Elliot Trudeau, and who greatly deepened it under its other administrations, especially that of John Chretien.

Taiwan may be out in the cold, with the U.N. and most U.N. nations against them, but there are a handful of brave nations that have defied China and the U.N. and established relations anyway. They are; Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, Paraguay, Nicaragua, El Salvador, Swaziland, Solomon Islands, Belize, Saint Lucia, Kiribati, Saint Vincent And The Grenadines, Marshall Islands, Saint Kitts And Nevis, Palau, Tuvalu, Nauru, and Vatican City.

What about the United States? Does the United States officially recognize Taiwan? This is a very interesting question because before Donald Trump became president the answer would be, "No." Pre-Trump U.S. presidents did not want to rock the boat and offend China, nor did they dare to threaten the business relationship that the United States has had with China. However, with the passing of the Taiwan Travel Act on March 16, 2018, by the U.S., relations between the United States and Taiwan are now official. Both governments have also signed a consular agreement, on September 13, 2019, formalizing their existent consular relations.

The question is, "Does the signing of this act and these agreements constitute official diplomatic recognition?" It appears that it does and this has majorly poked Communist China in the eye. China could not afford to cut off relations with The United States without

incurring colossal economy damage. At the same time there is now a country that has defied their threat and defied the United Nations. China won't break off relations with the United States. China is having to suck it up as Trump America has blown their bluff.

What about Canada? Lets take a closer look at this relationship. Liberal Canada is all too willing to do business with both China and Taiwan. Canada imports from China vastly more than it exports to them. What is the difference? Well, according to The University Of Alberta's China Institute, in 2019 Canada imported \$75 billion dollars worth of Chinese goods. However, the Canadian government reports to the public a more modest number of \$46.8 billion. Canadian exports to China that year were \$24.4 billion. Canada's exports to China are mainly Agri-food, motor vehicles, wood pulp and lumber resources. In 2019, Canadian agricultural exports have been hit hard, due to Chinese imposed tariffs with the value of soybean and canola seed exports down 98.1% and 69%.

Does Canada trade with Taiwan? Oh, yes. From the Canadian government I was only able to get information from 2018 but, in that year, Canada sold \$2 billion in goods to Taiwan, and purchased \$5.9 billion from them.

Liberal Canadian politicians have been very careful not to offend China, while at the same time do business with Taiwan. They have walked in step with the United Nations policy of not officially recognizing Taiwan. Canadian Liberals have been keeping China happy and defending China's image of strength.

Is it not time to re-think our policy towards Taiwan and China? China benefits from trade with Canada in a far greater way than Canada benefits from its trade with China. Even if we accept the Canadian governments low numbers as correct, Canada is buying twice as much from China as it is selling to them. China has Canada over a barrel, heavily tariffing our exports, to China's advantage. China is bullying Taiwan and is coercing most of the world into going along with this bullying. Up until now Canada has been looking the other way nervously not wanting to disrupt the status quo.

What if we blew China's bluff and officially recognized Taiwan? Would China cut Canada off? They would have to be a fool to cut off a relationship with Canada that they have been milking for decades. China has separated us from so much of our money and continues to rake in so much of Canada's wealth that I doubt that they would break relations with us. However a decision to recognize Taiwan would be one way of standing up to the bully, calling China's bluff and weakening China's influence. Beyond that, it is just the right thing to do. Canadian values reject communist revolutions and police states. I think its time for our liberal politicians to start respecting and reflecting Canadian values.

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CHINA'S ONE-CHILD NOW TWO-CHILD POLICY

There is a reason that China has the highest suicide rate for women than any other country on earth. It is also the only country in the world where more women commit suicide than men. Yet most of us know little about this or about the plight of women in communist China. I warn you, this article has been the most difficult one I have ever written. It may be the most difficult one you ever read.

In 1979 the communist government mandated that families were only allowed to have one child and although there were some exceptions made, it was generally enforced. The law was only changed in 2015 to allow for two children per family.

How do you enforce a one-child policy? China's government enforced their policy by exorbitant fines, detention, torture, forced sterilization and forced abortions.

Forced abortions are where a pregnant woman wants to bring her unborn child to term but a government steps in and says no, steps in and arrests her, steps in and forcibly kills her child against her mother's will.

More wealthy Chinese women have been able to escape the law by paying fines that range from half to ten times their annual income. Others who could afford to, moved to Hong Kong where the laws were different. However, for most Chinese women there is no way out of an illegal pregnancy. There is also no way of hiding it.

Additional penalties for resisting a government imposed abortion have in some cases included the abduction of family members, the destruction of personal property and even the demolition of their homes.

Even Chinese women who have not yet had their first child are in danger if they have not followed the rules to the letter. Jin Yani was pregnant with her first child but she did not have a pregnancy permit from the government. In September of 2000, police broke down the doors to her home, arrested her and dragged her to a family planning centre where five people held her down and forcibly

aborted her child. She went into severe hemorrhaging and only survived after spending 44 days in hospital.

Sometimes to avoid this kind of injury to the women, the officials will tie a woman to a bed and just kill the newly born child on delivery.

Activists who expose stories like these are also in great danger. Chen Guangcheng exposed 130, 000 forced abortions and was arrested and sentenced to four years of prison. In prison he has been enduring torture and is in a weakened condition because of untreated medical needs.

Another problem created by China's limitation on births is "Forsaken Children." When a Chinese couple breaks up, many times they have a child. When they remarry they often will abandon the child from their first marriage so as to be able to have a child with their new spouse. This has led to a huge orphan problem in China.

Cases like that of Lui Daan are especially troubling. It was discovered that this 21-year-old woman was pregnant outside of marriage. She was forcibly arrested from her home and taken to a family planning center. Her family members followed and advocated for her. When it was made clear that the abortion would have to take place, the family asked for her to at least be taken to a hospital where Lui would at least have more professional care. This was denied. It was brought to the attention of the official in charge that Lui had a medical condition that made the procedure dangerous. They still

chose to go ahead. After it was all over Lui lay in a recovery bed but instead of recovering grew rapidly weaker. She was loosing blood. The family planning would not make an emergency call until the situation was so desperate and only after the family had pressed for it repeatedly. It was too late. At six AM that morning Lui passed into eternity. Her life on earth was over.

The following is the life experience of Wang Liping:

My name is Wang Liping, female, Han Chinese and 23 years old. I am living in Diaoyutai Village, Guying Town, Huiji District, Zhenzhou City, Henan Province. I had a boyfriend for several years and we had not completed our marriage procedures because of our poverty. In August 2007 I was pregnant by him. My family was in great joy because I am the oldest daughter in my family and this was the first time I was pregnant. My family has had no children for more than 10 years so they were all very happy and considered it very important.

At around 6pm on March 31, 2008, I was stopped by a couple of people on the street in Guying Town. They asked me to go with them. They told me they were from Guying Population and Family Planning Office when I asked who they were. However, they didn't show me their badges. They wanted to take me into their car but I refused to comply. So those people beat me up and dragged me to the Guying Hospital, PLA Air Force Hospital and Litang Hospital, and asked them to do induced labor on me. But none of those hospitals was willing to do that to me.

At 11:00 p.m., they took me to the Laoyachen Hospital, and forcibly induced labor on me without any examination or my signature. My seven-month unborn child was killed. At that time I was crying out loud for help and those people beat me up. They and some doctors and nurses pushed me onto the ground and took my pants off. Then they injected some medicine at my fetus' location in my belly, and then they roped me onto a sickbed. I could not resist this and nobody came to help me. I could not imagine that this brutal and bloody behavior could happen in the civilized 21st century.

When the injected medicine began to take effect, I had great pain in my belly. At 3:00 a.m., on April 2nd, my almost-fully-developed child was born. My child even mournfully cried for some minutes, and later the crying ceased. I cried out for help for a long time until a yawning nurse came and shouted at me: "No more crying!" I said: "Please take a look at my baby." That nurse took a glance and said it was dead and then put my baby beside me. I fainted on hearing this tragic news. When I woke up in the morning, there was a doctor standing by my bed and asked for money to "get rid of the fetus' body." I said I had no money and so they just used a plastic bag to wrap my baby and put it beside me.

I was totally crushed facing these Population and Family Planning workers, doctors and nurses who didn't have any medical ethics or humanity. I could not imagine that I would be deprived of my human rights like this in a society ruled by law. I was not allowed contact with my family until April 3rd. During the time I lost contact with my family, my family members went to the Population and Family Planning Office asking for the legal basis of my forcibly induced labor and the death of my fetus. Those Population and Family Planning

workers shouted at my family and drove my family members out of the government building. At the same time the Laoyachen Hospital again sent me a note asking for payment.

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Another gripping account is given, this time by a woman named Wujian:

It was the winter of 2004 when I found out that I was pregnant. It was beautiful to sense this life growing inside of me: what a miracle! Meanwhile, I was also very fearful since I did not have the Permit for Pregnancy or the Birth Permit, which means, according to Chinese law, this baby was not allowed to be born into this world. This baby would have to die in my womb. During that time in my hometown, this was the law decided by the Chinese Family Planning policy which brought fear on every family. Not only were my parents and family at risk, but also my other relatives.

Time flew as the little baby grew daily in my womb. While the baby moved more and more actively in my body, the maternal love also increased. The word "MOM" was not just a word anymore; it became a reality in my life. My baby and I were one, sharing the same blood.

Pretty soon, my lower stomach began to bulge. In order to protect my baby, I had to hide myself in a very old, shabby house in a remote area. There was no electricity at all in the room, and it was very dark even during the day. Fear and loneliness filled me every day, but as long as I could have my baby, I could stand anything. Many times, I was wakened at night by nightmares, as I dreamed that I was hunted and arrested by the Family Planning government officials and forced to have an abortion.

Eventually, the Family Planning government officials found out about my pregnancy. So they searched all over trying to arrest me, and while they could not find me, then they caught my father instead. They put my father into the detention center and beat him every day. On the fourth day after they caught my father, one neighbor came and told me that my father was dying: they would continue beating my father — even to death — until I went to the local hospital to get abortion. My heart was broken into pieces as I faced this terrifying dilemma: either my father or my baby, one of them had to die, and I had to make the decision.

Very soon after this, the worst thing happened: when several Family Planning government officials broke into the house where I was hiding, and without any words, they drug me into their van.

As soon as I got into the van, I found that another Mom was already inside the van. She told me she was carrying her first baby, and that she was 28 years old. She did not have the Permit of Pregnancy or the Birth Permit, and she was 7 months pregnant. She was so eager to keep this baby that she was fighting with the government officers in the van. Suddenly, one government official at his 20's slapped her on the face and immediately her mouth began to bleed. Being thus insulted, she screamed like a lion and fought with the Family Planning government officials.

About one hour later, the van stopped in the hospital. As soon as I was drug out of the van, I saw hundred of pregnant Moms there – all of them, just like pigs in the slaughterhouse. Immediately I was drug into a special room, and without any preliminary medical examination, one nurse did Oxytocin injection intravenously. Then I was put into a room with several other Moms.

The room was full of Moms who had just gone through a forced abortion. Some Moms were crying, some Moms were mourning, some Moms were screaming, and one Mom was rolling on the floor with unbearable pain.

I was not very sensitive to the oxytocin injection, and then I was pulled into another small room. One nurse pulled out one, big,

8-inch long needle for intramuscular injection. I had never seen such big, long needle in my life. As soon as they pulled away my clothes, the nurse put her hand around my lower stomach; the fear and her cold hand caused my abdominal muscle to spasm. Because of that, for a while, the nurse could not do the injection.

At that moment, I was the only Mom in the room. I began begging the nurse while I cried, , "I have already had the oxytocin injection, please let me go; I will go as far away as possible and I will not tell anyone else what you had done for me and I will be grateful for you for the rest of my life." The nurse did not respond to my begging—she looked like wood.

Then I kept saying to her, "You are an angel, as a nurse or a doctor who is helping people and saving peoples' life; how could you become a killer by killing people every day?" I could hardly see her face because she wearied a big mask. Soon she became very angry at what I said, and told me that I talked too much. She also told me that there was nothing serious about this whole thing for her. She did these all year. She also told me that there were over 10,000 forced abortions in our county just for that year, and I was having just one of them. I was astonished by her words and I realized that my baby and I were just like a lamb on the cutting board. Finally, she put the big, long needle into the head of my baby in my womb. At the moment, it was the end of the world for me and I felt even time

had stopped. I hardly knew that something worse would happen later.

After the injection, my baby became very quiet for a whole day. I was so naive that I thought I could leave the hospital because I had finished the forced injection. I wondered if perhaps my baby was lucky enough that s/he could survive.

To my great surprise, the next evening I was drug into a surgical room. I was asked to lie down on a surgical table; it was the Guillotine for me and for my baby. While I was lying down on the surgical table I found that there was bloody fingerprint on the wall, left by other Moms during their surgery of a forced abortion.

One doctor told me that I brought too much trouble to them already because my baby was supposed to flow out by itself after the injection. Since it did not come out as expected, they decided to cut my baby into pieces in my womb with scissors, and then suck it out with a special machine.

What I had done in my life that made me deserve this kind of punishment? What evil thing was this all about? Even a wild animal like a tiger will give her life to save their own baby

tiger. As a Mom and a human being, could I not even protect the life of my baby?

I did not have any time to think as this most horrifying surgery began by force. I could hear the sound of the scissors cutting the body of my baby in my womb. I could feel that, little by little, my baby was cut into pieces; s/he was separated from my body. S/he was the flesh of my flesh, the bone of my bone, a part of my body. That kind of pain not only killed my body, but also killed my emotions and my feelings.

"How could I be a Mom? What's wrong with me?" I cried while talking to my baby and I preferred to die together with my baby at that moment. Nothing sounded meaningful at all for me in this world: In fact, part of me had already died – part of me was already gone and gone forever!

Eventually the journey in hell, the surgery was finished, and one nurse showed me part of a bloody foot with her tweezers. Through my tears, the picture of the bloody foot was engraved into my eyes and into my heart, and so clearly I could see the five small bloody toes. Immediately the baby was thrown into a trash can...

Finally, I was allowed to go home from the hospital. I did not eat anything, or even drink any water, for several days. I barely

talked with anyone. From time to time at home, I could hear the mourning of my father. He was released after I was caught, but he had been beaten terribly; it took him over a month to recover physically. Looking at my father, thinking of my dead baby, I cried day and night, and frequently the picture of the little bloody foot came up in my mind. Physically I recovered after about one month, but psychologically and spiritually – never! At that time, I got a migraine headache, and it is with me up to today.

Some people have said that time is the best medicine and time can heal everything. But this is not the case for me: as time goes on, the suffering is getting worse and worse and memory is getting clearer and clearer.

Thank God I became a Christian; God did help me and healed me. The Bible teaches us that as long as we confess our sin, we will be forgiven. Frequently I come to the Lord, asking for forgiveness. I know God has already forgiven my sin, but very often I could not forgive myself. I do believe that I will meet my baby again in heaven. If God allows, I will ask the forgiveness from my baby when I see him/her in heaven.

As a Chinese saying says, whenever you have broken your tooth, you swallow it by yourself. I never shared this experience

with anyone before, because the scars in my heart are one million times more painful than the scars on my body!

While I was writing this short testimony, several times I cried out and I could not continue writing. I knew that there are millions of Chinese sisters are suffering and will suffer the same thing that I suffered.

Who could help them? Who could save them? The one-child policy and forced abortion policy have killed millions of innocent lives in China. How could this inhuman crime be stopped? When could this inhuman crime be stopped?

May God forgive me, that on that day I will meet my baby in heaven!

There is a reason that the woman's suicide rate in China is five times the world's average, approximately 500 woman a day. The communist party of China is not humane. They are bullies in the most extreme sense of the word. It is time for our government to stop pandering to the Chinese communist party, stop their pro-China polices, start demanding change and start severing ties with this monster government. 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LIBERAL LOYALTIES TO THE COMMUNIST PARTY OF CHINA

The Communist Party of China is our enemy, not our friend. It is time for Liberals and Democrats to change from upside-down thinking to right-side-up thinking. If only they had done so a generation ago we would not be facing the communist monster.

In 1949, a revolution broke out in China. It was a Communist Revolution against the ruling Qing Dynasty. Little by little, the revolution ate up the country until all but Taiwan and Mongolia were under its control. Was the Communist Revolution a friendly progressive socialist movement that bettered the lives of its impoverished masses? No, it was a mean revolution.

Untold suffering was to follow the establishment of communist rule in China. The Chinese Communist Revolution was followed by the Chinese Cultural Revolution (1958 to 1962). This revolution was an overhauling of the entire country, converting it from an agrarian society to a commune-based economy where there is no private ownership. Such an overhaul involved partly industrializing the economy also and led to a great famine. Those who did not cooperate with the overhaul were brutally crushed. Like in Russia under Stalin, only much greater, the process led to an enormous death toll. Although uncertain the death toll for the Chinese Cultural Revolution is estimated at between 18 to 45 million people. The Chinese Communist Government calls this overhaul "The Great Leap Forward."

This overhaul involved a system of 1,000 forced labor camps. Approximately 50 million Chinese passed through these camps. It is estimated that twenty million died from the primitive living conditions and 14-hour work days. The communists also felt the need to execute the country's educational elite. Moa boasted of killing 46,000 scholars.

If you were not one of the millions slaughtered in the great leap forward, you could look forward to a communistic life. Impoverished free Chinese workers were now impoverished communist workers working for the socialist state. In the coming decades Chinese society would evolve. New technologies would keep adding more and more tools for surveillance and suppression of the population. China practices the suppression of religious freedom, the suppression of freedom of speech, the suppression of freedom of the press, suppression of freedom of association, the suppression of freedom of assembly and practices organ harvesting. Christian churches are frequently disrupted and their leaders arrested. Churches are sometimes bulldozed down so that their congregants can't use them. China controls what its citizens can and cannot view on the internet. It practices numerous forms of torture. China requires, for their records, the DNA samples, fingerprints, eye scans and blood types of millions of people. China has a mass surveillance system for monitoring the Chinese population. It includes video cameras, mobile phone tracking surveillance drones, etc. By 2019, it is believed that 200 million monitoring surveillance cameras were in operation in China as part of their skynet system. However, by the end of 2020 it is forecast that they will have 626 million surveillance cameras in operation. Chinese citizens have a "Social Credit" number assigned to them and this number increases and decreases, depending on their behaviour. Your social credit number score determines how many freedoms you are permitted to enjoy. Chinese internment camps are another hot topic on which we have no transparency from Chinese authorities. As of 2018, it was estimated that the Chinese government has detained hundreds of thousands, or perhaps a million, of its people in these camps. For decades it only allowed one child per family, with certain exceptions, and required

abortion when mothers became pregnant outside of these parameters. China practices capital punishment, not just for murder but for a number of offenses. It is estimated that over 1000 people are executed every year in China. The iron fist is in full swing and many of us in western nations find China's controls over its people excessive and cruel.

When the Chinese Communist party first came to power the world community was slow to accept them and shake their blood-stained hands. They also were not doing well and China's economic future looked bleak. That is, unless they could receive help from some outside source that believed in them. They would find help and forge a new and crucial friendship that would afterward set them up for success. They were befriended by Liberals and Democrats.

While few western democratic countries were willing to shake their blood-stained hands, Liberal Canadian Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau reversed Canada's previous position towards China and established relations with the Communist Party of China. Canada was one of the first western countries to embrace the regime. The Liberal Jean Chretien years saw a great deepening of that relationship. His government gave them access to the powers of the Mutual Legal Assistance In Criminal Matters Act. The Chretien administration supported China's accession to the World Trade Organization. Chretien's International Trade Minister, Roy MacLaren said "To get China into the WTO was fundamental to our trade policy....I have no doubt that the China strategy was the right one. Of course, Canada was not alone in promoting China to the World Trade Organization. This was an American Democrat objective also and was strongly pushed for by Democrat, President Bill Clinton. It was thought that this would do a lot for globalism. It was lobbied hard for and pushed through and, on 11 December 2001, China was fully established as a member of the WTO.

What was the result of China being accepted into the WTO? Economic boom for China! The rest of the world's free capitalistic market economies have not been able to compete with China's manufacturing empire which is fully government- owned, government-underwritten and government-regulated. China's government has made colossal profits as Liberal and Democrat administrations have accepted huge trade deficits, favouring China, as being normal.

- Beijing will have a new policing force in Hong Kong, that is not subject to the regional government of Hong Kong.
- Rulings of the national security commission, cannot be appealed.
- Foreign news agencies will not work autonomously.

The law was meant to crush the protest movement that began in 2019. The protests broke out in 2019 over an extradition bill put forward by the Hong Kong government that would have allowed for certain wanted individuals to be extradited to elsewhere in China to be judged by the Chinese communist system. This was a clear violation of the semi-autonomous conditions and Hong Kong residents began protesting. The protests begun in 2019 have continued into 2020. These protests have grown to unprecedented levels in Hong Kong and have been reported on throughout the world.

With the new law in place the Chinese Communist Party has begun its crackdown. One gripping photo on the news showed a young Hong Kong man being handcuffed and on his T-Shirt was labeled the words "COURAGE." Demonstrators are exhibiting enormous courage. Parents are watching their twenty-year-old children being carried off to what could be life sentences.

The communist government of China is a monster and Canadians don't understand why our Liberal politicians don't

get it. We don't care if commerce with China is good for globalism! Communist China has a long history of brutally suppressing its people. It gives them no freedom. It gives them no privacy. It tells them what to believe. It controls what information they can view. It imposes forced abortions on women who don't obey its one-child, now two-child, policy. It has been involved in organ harvesting. It steals our technology. It engages in intense cyber warfare against us. It has Canadian citizens in its jails. Canadians are outraged!

Canadians are outraged and look to our Liberal government for a response. What do we find? We want change, but our prime minister seems to be on another page. In March of 2020, the Trudeau government (Justin Trudeau) allowed for the sale of the Canadian company, Continental Gold to China's state owned Zing Mining for 1.3 billion dollars.. During this same time America was working to establish an Indo-Pacific Alliance made up of a number of South Asian countries to shift trade away from China to the new alliance. This

has not gone unnoticed by the government of China. They are concerned. There has already been a shift. Large American companies have already begun diversifying their production away from China and to Indo-Pacific Alliance countries. These American companies include Google and Microsoft. Moves like this spell out serious losses for China. Japan, who is an Indo-Pacific Alliance country is following the U.S. example by paying 87 companies to shift production out of China. This will mean a significant restructuring for China to try to mitigate these losses. A sustained trade war with the U.S., combined with a shift in manufacturing away from China, could potentially fracture the Chinese economy and force the Communist Party of China into making large concessions on issues like human rights.

Many Canadians, like myself, would like to see our Canadian government show this kind of resistance to the the Communist Party Of China. It would mean a big reversal in our foreign policy. The Chinese government does not represent our values. We don't care if it is good for globalism. China's government is a bully. We don't agree that it was a good idea to establish relations with this communist government in the first place. We don't think that China should be allowed to participate in the WTO as long as it is under its present leadership. We want to see Canada impose heavy tariffs on Chinese trade if its government does not change. How many more protesters have to be arrested? How long will fundamental human rights be denied because China doesn't recognize them? How long do we have to be intertwined in their economy? How long do we have to be exposed to their cyber threat? We want to see change.

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
